BUG HOTEL COMPETITION WINNERS!



ATTENDANCE

'Moments Matter, Attendance Counts'

Attendance at school is as much about pupil well-being as academic success. Being in school supports pupil's friendships, confidence and wider development. When pupils miss school, the impact of 'feeling behind' can be a barrier to their future success. Government data shows that 84% of Key Stage 2 pupils who had 100% attendance achieved the expected standard, compared to 40% of pupils who were persistently absent across the key stage. If pupils are not in school, we can not support them to learn.

FOREST SCHOOL FUN!

Forest school has started back for the Summer Term and brought just as much joy as ever! Beech Class have been naming plants, learning more about the life cycles of frogs and using numbers in the environment. Cedar Class thought about weeds and vegetables. They tried to distinguish between weeds and vegetables by looking at the leaves, the shape of the plant and smell. They counted 35 garlic plants growing nice and strong and 14 potato plants. They talked about what they wanted to make with them once they have grown and what they need to grow strong. The children have been learning this in class so it was a great opportunity to recap and link the science lesson. The children used trowels and forks to loosen the weeds and fluff up the soil to make sure air could get in to make the plant healthy and strong. Elm Class used secateurs and loppers to cut the willow to size and used a knife/ potato peelers to whittle the ends of the sticks into a point. This was all to make a pen to write with for the lesson!
